
- 4 pre-meeting sessions on the morning of Wednesday, September 18th. Breakfast will be provided to all presession attendees.

- 6 sunrise sessions on Friday, September 20th
- A panel session on Wednesday, September 18th focusing on International Trauma Care Economics
- Fitts Oration: Timothy C. Fabian, MD will present "A Seussian Tale of a Trauma Time Traveler" on Friday, September 20th.
- Two Master Surgeon Lectures: J. Wayne Meredith, MD will present on Wednesday, September 18th, and Gregory Jurkovich, MD will present on Friday, September 20th.
- Presidential Address: AAST's president, Martin Croce, MD will give his presidential address on Thursday, September 19th.
- Emergency Surgery Course (ESC): New this year on our program is the Emergency Surgery Course, which will take place outside of the traditional Annual Meeting hours. The ESC will be held all day on Monday, September 16th and Tuesday, September 17th. The ESC is a full two-day course that provides emergency surgery education and includes breakout sessions, case discussions, topic reviews, and more. Please note: participants must register separately for this course.

The Annual Meeting program itself will cover a broad range of Acute Care Surgery topics, with more than fifty-five different institutions represented in the oral paper sessions alone. The social program will also be exceptional. Make your plans early. I look forward to seeing you all in Dallas in September.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

Martin A. Croce, MD, FACS, was born in Camden, NJ in 1957. He obtained a Bachelor of Science from the University of Notre Dame in 1979, and his medical degree from the University of Tennessee in 1983. He completed his residency at the University of Tennessee in 1988 and then completed a Fellowship in Surgical Critical Care at the University of Miami, Jackson Memorial Hospital in 1989. He returned to the Department of Surgery at the University of Tennessee in 1989 where he was the Professor of Surgery and Chief of Trauma and Surgical Critical Care at the University of Tennessee Health Science Center in Memphis. In 2017 he became the Chief Medical Officer at Regional Health One. He presently serves as the President for the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma, First Vice President of the Southern Surgical Association, and also is a Director for the American Board of Surgery. His research interests include all aspects of the care of the trauma patient, with a particular interest in ventilator-associated pneumonia.



Gregory Jurkovich, MD, FACS

MASTER SURGEON LECTURE

Gregory Jerome ("Jerry") Jurkovich, MD, FACS is the Donant Professor of Trauma Surgery and the Vice-Chairman for Clinical Affairs and Quality for the Department of Surgery at UC Davis Health System in Sacramento, California.

Prior to relocating to California, Dr. Jurkovich served as the Director of Surgery and Trauma Services at Denver Health, and was the Rockwell Professor of Surgery at the University of Colorado. That position followed nearly twenty-four years at the University of Washington and Harborview Medical Center in Seattle as a professor and the Chief of Trauma respectively. He began his surgical career as Chief of Trauma at the University of South Alabama.

Dr. Jurkovich is a past president of the AAST, where he is well known for developing the Acute Care Surgery Committee and its fellowship training paradigm, and for being the editor of the textbook ACS Surgery: Principles and Practices. He is the current chair of the National Trauma Institute (NTI) and the co-chair of the Coalition for National Trauma Research (CNTR). He has also been the President of the Western Trauma Association, Vice-Chairman of the ACS Committee on Trauma, and a past director of the American Board of Surgery.

Dr. Jurkovich is a Minnesota native, from the Mesabi Iron range. He received an undergraduate degree in biomedical engineering (cum laude) from Northwestern University and his medical degree from the University of Minnesota. His surgery residency was at the University of Colorado, and he completed his trauma research fellowship at Duke University.

FITTS LECTURE

Tim Fabian grew up in Marion, Ohio. He received his undergraduate degree from Loyola University in Chicago and his medical degree from Loyola's Stritch School of Medicine. Following his general surgery residency at Ohio State University, he moved to Atlanta where he completed a trauma fellowship at Grady Memorial Hospital and Emory University. After serving two years on the faculty at Emory, he moved to the University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center in Memphis where he has remained for the rest of his academic career.

Dr. Fabian founded the Presley Trauma Center in 1983, which has become one of the busiest trauma centers in the nation. He served as the chairman of the Department of Surgery at the University at Tennessee - Memphis for sixteen years (1999-2015), and he is a past president of both the Eastern Association for the Surgery of Trauma and the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma. He has conducted clinical and translational research throughout his career, and that work has resulted in approximately 450 peer-reviewed publications and four US patents. Tim Fabian is currently the editor-in-chief of Trauma Surgery and Acute Care Open, a publication of the AAST, and a professor emeritus in the Department of Surgery at the University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center.

MASTER SURGEON LECTURE

Dr. Meredith is the Richard T. Myers Professor and Chair of the Department of Surgery (formerly General Surgery), Chief of Clinical Chairs and Chief of Surgery at Wake Forest Baptist Health. A graduate of Emory University, Dr. Meredith received his M.D. from Bowman Gray School of Medicine and joined the faculty of Wake Forest University Health Sciences in 1987 and was named Professor and Chairman of General Surgery in 1997 and Director of Surgical Sciences in 2000 to June 2014. Dr. Meredith holds a cross-appointment at the Institute for Regenerative Medicine and a joint appointment as Professor of Pediatrics in the Department of Pediatrics.

Dr. Meredith has served as Director of the American Board of Surgery and the American Board of Thoracic Surgery. He is a past-president of the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma (AAST), the Southern Surgical Association (SSA), the Halsted Society, the Eastern Association for the Surgery of Trauma (EAST), and the Southeastern Surgical Congress (SESC). Dr. Meredith served as the Medical Director of Trauma Programs of the American College of Surgeons (ACS) from 2006 through 2010 and was Chair of the Committee on Trauma from 2002 to 2006. In 2014, Dr. Meredith was recipient of the ACS Distinguished Service Award recognizing his scientific contributions to cardiovascular physiology during resuscitation, trauma registries, and trauma systems, as well as his leadership and dedicated service as a Fellow of the ACS.



The goal will be to help leaders and providers understand how to best position their Acute Care Surgery service within the broader department of surgery at their institutions. This session will complement the high-level discussion on the direction and future of ACS; the Economics Committee will hold this second discussion as a panel session. Specific topics to be addressed include:









- How to determine the right size of the workforce needed to address the tripartite mission of ACS while assuring provider wellness. Will include a discussion about the use of advanced practice providers to accomplish this goal.
- How to position the section in a department that uses an RVU-driven model for determining the flow of internal funds, and how to position the team and service given the increased cognitive (evaluation and management) component inherent in both trauma and critical care delivery, and the changes to CMS requirements for critical care services. This will include discussions about safety nets, responses to failure to rescue, etc.
- How to make a service financially viable—including methods to assure both departmental and institutional funding streams—recognizing that to support an ACS service, at least 30 percent of the budget must come from external sources.

As acute care surgery and the world become more diverse, it is essential that academic surgeons understand issues of diversity and inclusion in the workplace. People of color, women, and LGBTQ individuals may face microaggressions, unintentional or intentional bias, and outright discrimination. Many organizations, including AAST, have been proactive about codes of conduct and other resources. Data on the causes of death from the recent wars has compelled military research to develop new approaches to vascular injury, hemorrhage control, and resuscitation. New Public Law and federal policy have made the FDA accommodating to potentially lifesaving products developed for battlefield use. As new methods and products emerge from the military R&D program, they are unproven and often controversial in civilian trauma practices. However, the DoD needs collaboration with civilian centers to study, improve, and integrate new approaches that may improve wartime injury survival and recovery. This session will present several new approaches and technologies supported by the DoD trauma research program, and pose the question "do military innovations work and can they be studied in the civilian world?". The session will also lead discussion on how civilian centers can collaborate with the DoD in a manner that is open to new innovation, but does not disrupt practice or put patients at risk.

According to the US Census Bureau, the estimated population of individuals older than 65 years of age was 35 million in 2006, and it is expected that the older population will double to 70 million by 2030. This group is anticipated grow to more than 86 million, or one in five persons, by 2050. Currently, older adults have fewer disabilities and more active lifestyles than those of previous generations, which increases their risk of injury. At least one study from 1990 estimated that 40 percent of all trauma patients will be 65 or older by 2050. That number is likely to be higher, as some major trauma centers are already exceeding that figure. Trauma in the elderly accounts for \$12 billion in annual medical expenditures and \$25 billion in total annual healthcare expenditures. It is well known that injured geriatric patients do worse than younger patients. Elderly trauma patients face an increased risk for adverse outcomes after injury. Therefore, it is essential that clinicians treating older injured patients are able to identify techniques and management strategies demonstrated to improve outcomes. There are evidenced-based strategies for improving outcomes in the injured geriatric patient and this session will focus on how best to achieve optimal outcomes.

ENDOSCOPIC MANAGEMENT OF GI BLEEDING FOR THE ACUTE CARE SURGEON

The goal of this modular endoscopy course is to provide a didactic overview of available treatment modalities for the management of gastrointestinal hemorrhage (including indications, contraindications, and necessary equipment). The lecture component is heavily video based and will emphasize pathology recognition and correct application of endoscopic techniques. Subsequently, participants will have hands-on application of these modalities in explant models. The target audience is the acute care and general surgeon with limited access to gastroenterology services, and on whom falls the management of GI bleeding which might otherwise require surgical intervention, a delay in endoscopic care, or transfer of the patient to another facility. Course participants should already perform basic endoscopy in their practice (e.g., colonoscopy with polypectomy, upper endoscopy with PEG, and the like) and be familiar with basic endoscope function and navigation. The course will highlight application of these therapies in patients with bleeding from pathological sources (such as peptic ulcer disease) as well as those with bleeding following a procedural intervention (such as post-polypectomy bleeding or anastomotic bleeding).
