DEFINING THE ACUTE CARE SURGEON: FTE'S, COMPENSATION AND CAREER TRAJECTORY



TAKING THE NEXT STEP: A COMPREHENSIVE AP-PROACH TO MAKING THE TRANSITION TO INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATOR (PART 2)

On the second day, participants will have the opportunity to pitch their own research ideas to a group of expert panelists, who will provide feedback in real-time. The group will then be divided into multiple break-out sessions to discuss specific aspects in various research disciplines, including basic and translational science, health services and outcomes research, qualitative research and mixed methods, and others. The two-day course will culminate with a keynote address highlighting the need to expand the current number of surgeon scientists, with an emphasis on trauma, acute care surgery, and surgical critical care.

THE 2023 AAST NEUROCRITICAL CARE UPDATE AND BOARD REVIEW COURSE

This session will be a high-level review of modern neurocritical care concepts and practice, as well as a board exam preparation course. Neurocritical care has traditionally been a major component of both medical and surgical critical care practice but has lacked a formal subspecialty certification process that is readily open to surgical intensivists. In 2021, the American Board of Surgery announced a newly established subspecialty certification in Neurocritical Care that is a collaborative effort with the American Board of Anesthesiology and the American Board of Neurology and Psychiatry. Preparation for this exam requires not only familiarization with standard neurotrauma management, but also knowledge in non-surgical areas such as acute stroke and other neurologic emergencies, neuroanatomy and MRI interpretation, and neuropharmacology. This session will provide an intense focused review covering the core topics and focus areas that will be covered on the Neurocritical Care Exam and topics relevant to Acute Care Surgeons providing neurocritical care services. The format will involve short didactic lectures on high-yield topics as well as case examples with sample question and answer reviews. In addition to the syllabus materials, attendees will also receive a copy of 'The Pocket Guide to Neurocritical Care' which will be included in the registration fee.


UPDATES AND TIPS ON BILLING FOR TRAUMA AND SURGICAL CRITICAL CARE



MANAGEMENT OF PEDIATRIC TRAUMA PATIENTS: OPTIMAL CARE IN EVERY FACILITY

The annual pediatric educational session will showcase collaborations between Adult and Pediatric Trauma Surgeons striving to ensure optimal pediatric care in every facility. An expert panel mixed with both adult and pediatric surgeons will review challenging pediatric cases (trauma or acute care) cared for in adult centers, that may highlight clinical complexities or system challenges. The panel will use the case examples to engage in discussions about the best possible pediatric clinical care, utilization of good collaborations between centers, and considerations for children in local trauma systems of care. This discussion will delve into those uncomfortable moments when a child needs a strong adult trauma center to get good care rapidly and the pediatric partnerships that make ongoing improvement a reality.

SOLUTIONS TO ACHIEVING HEALTH EQUITY AND **ELIMINATING HEALTH CARE DISPARITIES WITHIN ACUTE CARE SURGERY**

Addressing disparities within Acute Care Surgery is important not only from a social justice and equity standpoint, but also for improving the overall health and economic prosperity of our patients. People of color and other underserved groups experience higher rates of morbidity and mortality. As the population becomes more diverse, with people of color projected to account for over half of the population by 2050, it is increasingly important to address systemic disparities particularly within the field of acute care surgery. Effective January 1, 2023, new and revised requirements to reduce health care disparities will apply to organizations in the Joint Commission ambulatory health care, behavioral health care and human services, critical access hospital, and hospital accreditation programs. The move comes after the Joint Commission originally released an advisory for health care leaders to make health equity a strategic priority in July 2021. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) will also begin tying reimbursement to achieving health equity. How do we as Acute Care Surgeons ensure alignment with the Joint Commission and CMS in achieving health equity and eliminating health disparities for our patients?

IN PURSUIT OF AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SURGEONS EGS VERIFICATION: A NUTS AND BOLTS GUIDE TO VERIFICATION

- In September of 2022, the American College of Surgeons launched the verification program for Emergency General Surgery. This program aims to improve care of the EGS patient by defining key components of strong EGS programs with a focus on process improvement, data capture (and hence research) and evolution of care from regional hospitals to large quaternary centers. Though the requirements for verification are readily available on the ACS website, the practicalities of standing up a program and what a site visit entails are not familiar to many. The aim of this lunch session includes:
 - a. Key aspects of an EGS program that should be in place for a successful visit
 - b. How to engage hospital and departmental leadership in supporting the pursuit of EGS verification
 - c. Practical aspects of the site visit and how to get started/proceed/complete a successful visit

OPTIONAL SESSIONS

DISASTER SURGICAL SURGE: WHEN MASS TRAUMA THREATENS TO OVERWHELM YOUR OPERATING ROOMS

When a disaster response includes multiple patients who all need emergent surgical intervention, the system can be stressed in ways not routinely anticipated by standard disaster planning. Mass casualty and disaster drills generally focus on "front of hospital" triage but frequently "end" when a patient is determined to require surgery. Consideration of a disaster plan that fully includes the operating room is often overlooked. This session will discuss DMEP requirements and the new electronic DMEP course as well as focus on the logistics involved when a disaster or mass casualty response includes mobilization of multiple operating rooms at once. The ability to

recall extra OR teams at night, the ability to clear operating rooms during the day, the availability of surgical instruments at the end of a long elective day and staffing concerns must all be considered as a response plan is expanded to include the operating room. While each institution is different, this session will help participants to identify gaps and weaknesses in disaster plans that do not specifically address operating room readiness.
